# Arts of the Islamic World and India and Modern and Contemporary Middle East Sales Bring a Combined Total of £12M / \$16M

Arts of the Islamic World and India Almost Doubles its Estimate with Tens of Works Selling for Multiples of their High Estimate, Led by:

A Pair of Silver Mounted Pistols made for Tipu Sultan: £1.1m (est. £60,000-80,000)

A set of albums containing fifty-two paintings of Indian costumes, held in the same family since the original commission 225 years ago: £609,600 (est. £50,000-80,000)

A jade 'horse-head' hilted dagger and scabbard: £406,400 (est. £20,000-30,000)

New Records Bishan Singh - A Record for any Sikh Artwork, and for Inji Efflatoun

# Arts of the Islamic World & India:

- Sale Total: £10,088,793 / \$13,454,919 (est. £4.4 6.6m)
- Just over half of lots sold achieved prices above their high estimate
- Almost 20% of buyers were new to Sotheby's
- Participation from 25 countries across the world with lively bidding from Central Asia, and across the Middle East, India, Europe and the United States
- Key Results:
  - A painting of Maharaja Ranjit Singh in procession through a Baazar by Bishan Singh, made an auction record for the artist and a record for Sikh art, selling to an institution for £952,500 / \$1.3m (est. £200,000-300,000, Lot 220)
  - A pair of silver-mounted flintlock pistols made for Tipu Sultan, sold to a private collector for almost 14x their high estimate, achieving £1.1m / \$1.4 (est. £60,000-80,000, Lot 223)
  - The first lot in the sale, a rare late 16th-century (r. 1556-1605) Qur'an manuscript from the library of Mughal Emperor Akbar in India, sparked a 15-minute bidding battle, selling for £863,600 / \$1,151,740 (est. £40,000-60,000, Lot 101)
  - A set of albums containing fifty-two paintings of Indian costumes, which had remained in the same family since being commissioned at least 225 years ago, sold for £609,600 / \$812,993 (est. £50,000-80,000, Lot 232)
  - A silver-mounted flintlock blunderbuss (bukmar) made for Tipu Sultan, sold for £571,500 / \$762,181 (est. £60,000-80,000, Lot 224)
  - An extremely rare illustrated manuscript of the Ka'banameh, dating from Dhu'l-Hijjah 1080 AH/April-May 1670 AD, sold for £444,500 / \$592,807 (est. £120,000-180,000, Lot 105)
  - A Mughal jade 'horse-head' hilted dagger and scabbard, sold for 14x its high estimate: £406,400 / \$541,995 (est. £20,000-30,000, Lot 203)
  - A line from one of the most impressive Qur'ans ever produced, the 'Baysunghur Qur'an' known for its immense scale sold to the Center of Islamic Civilization, Tashkent £241,300 / \$321,810 (est. £100,000-150,000, Lot 128)
  - A painting of Elephants frolicking in a mountain lake, India, circa 1630-40, sold for £139,700 / \$186,311 (est. £15,000-20,000, Lot 192)

- Just over a quarter of bidders were new to Sotheby's
- Key Results:
  - Record for a work by Inji Efflatoun, Untitled (Portrait of a Woman): £107,950 / \$143,714 (est. £40,000-60,000, Lot 1)
  - **FahreInissa Zeid**'s 'Carnations' one of the artist's personal favourites sold for £190,500 / \$253,613 (est. £40,000-60,000, Lot 5)

- Samia Halaby's vibrant Morning Honey: £95,250 / \$118,353 (est. £70,000-100,000, Lot 6)
- Sohrab Sepehri, Untitled: £88,900 / \$118,353 (est. £70,000-90,000, Lot 23)
- FahreInissa Zeid's High Seas at Eastbourne painted on the Sussex coast during a
  particularly tumultuous time in her life sold for £69,850 / \$92,991(est. £20,00030,000, Lot 3)
